2004 FACT SHEET

Facility Facts

Xerox's Cincinnati facility employs approximately 190 employees. This facility is responsible for returned Xerox products from customer locations at the end of their useful life for parts recovery and equipment remanufacturing. In 2004, parts remanufacturing decreased.

Resource Utilization and Conservation

Energy:

Xerox Corporation's Cincinnati facility decreased its energy consumption by 21 percent between 2003 and 2004. Electricity consumption was 6,202,062 kWh, a decrease of 2 percent over 2003, while natural gas consumption decreased by 38 percent to 151,288 therms. This decrease is due to volume reductions and less severe weather in 2004.

As a corporation, Xerox is a member of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Climate Leaders Program and the Business Roundtable's Climate RESOLVE program. Both programs are voluntary initiatives to help companies develop long-term climate change strategies. Xerox is on track to reach its goal of an absolute 10 percent company-wide reduction from 2002 through 2012 in greenhouse gas emissions resulting from energy consumption. In Cincinnati, Xerox's facility generated 6,375 tons of greenhouse gas emissions, a 9 percent reduction between 2003 and 2004.

Water Consumption:

Xerox's Cincinnati facility increased its water consumption by nearly 6 percent between 2003 and 2004. Water consumption in 2004 was 516,800 gallons.

Hazardous Waste:

The amount of hazardous waste generated in Cincinnati in 2004 was 3 tons and was 1 ton in 2003. This increase was due to a one-time impact from increased usage of a cleaning chemical prior to complete discontinuation of the hazardous chemical. Hazardous waste generation is expected to be minimal in the future due to eliminating this cleaning chemical. One hundred percent of the hazardous waste generated in Cincinnati in 2004 was beneficially managed through recycling, treatment, or fuel blending.

Non-Hazardous Waste: Total solid waste generated in Cincinnati decreased by almost 35 percent to 20,835 tons in 2004. Waste landfilled or incinerated off-site decreased by 43 percent in 2004, and 93 percent of non-hazardous solid waste was recycled or reused.
